## His Beatitude Fouad Twal Patriarch of Jerusalem

Your Beatitude, Archbishop Manoogian You Excellencies, Dear Fathers, Beloved Members of our respective communities,

t is our special joy to be here with you in this upper room", and close to you, on the great occasion of our celebration of the Birth of Jesus. We extend to you our benevolent and most cordial greetings. In the words of the Armenian tradition: "Christ is born and revealed!" "Good News for you and for us."

The Prophet Isaiah recounts the Seraphim crying to one another: "The whole earth is full of his glory!" Where do we see this glory that fills the earth? Looking around, we see much "un-glory" in our environment. We see a world where violence, self-worship, greed, egoism, and immorality dominate. Many souls are plunged into darkness.

In the face of present-day circumstances of chaos and danger, and especially remembering the horrible situations of the people in Syria, Iraq and Gaza, let us implore the Mother of God, who is Mother of us all, to suppress violence and wars, to crush the power of evil, and to establish her Son's kingdom in hearts, so that we will see the whole earth full of his glory.

For Armenians, this year possesses a depth of meaning5 with a message for each of its citizens. April 24th,

marks 100 years of the Armenian Genocide, when, during World War I, the Turkish forces murdered 1.5 mil lion Armenians living within the Ottoman Empire. They uprooted your ancestors from their historic lands, leaving their churches in ruin. Those who survived the Genocide were exiled, and scattered across the earth. To the present day, your people have a giant to defeat; one that comes in the form of denial. Turkey sees the Armenian genocide as a mere fantasy. Some nations have had the courage and convinction, to recognize condemn the Genocide. However, the giant of denial has lived far too long. It must be defeated with the truth. We pray for this victory!

This week, we started a Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. The theme: "Jesus said to the Samaritan woman: Give me to drink". This is the call of Jesus to each one of us. It is a call to satisfy Him. We should be pouring out ourselves now, spending to the last limit to satisfy His thirst, rather than simply drawing on Him, to satisfy our thirst. Our Christian responsibility is to be a satisfaction to Him.

We can be that satisfaction, if we fulfill His thirst for Unity in His Body. Therefore, let us be zealous to work and pray in a spirit of co-operation, and commitment to the Unity of the Christian Church. When we satisfy His thirst, there is no room for division. Consequently, may this week of prayer be a full and visible communion between us. Together we are jointly responsible for what is our common mission, which is to teach the apostolic faith and to witness to the love of Christ for all human beings, especially those living in difficult circumstances.

May God bless you, Your Beatitude, in your ministry, and may God bless our respective communities, as well as all the peoples of Armenia, Syria, Iraq and our beloved Holy Land, Amen.
